Created in 2011, this award is reserved for exceptional service in a TABCO leadership role; someone whose service has significantly enhanced the Association and the betterment of its membership and whose contributions have risen to a level determined to be worthy of special recognition; to be given in special circumstances.

Congratulations ~ and thank you, President Cindy Sexton

First and foremost, Cindy is mom to Christy, Pat, and Jess, and grandmother to Elliott. Education was not Cindy's first profession. Fortunately for us, 2001 launched Cindy's BCPS Library Media Specialist career at Villa Cresta Elementary School. As a conditionally certified teacher, Cindy simultaneously learned the craft of teaching while earning her master's degree. As one who loves learning and reading, Cindy instilled these qualities by impacting thousands of Villa Cresta students.

Cindy's association advocacy began as a Building Rep, informing and recruiting members. Her first MSEA RA in 2012 led to the Women's Leadership Training and NEA RA in 2013, but participating in the 2014 MSEA Summer Leadership Conference ignited action. Learning about effective local association attributes propelled Cindy to speak before the TABCO Board of Directors. She has not looked back since, sharing her learning and suggestions to become a more inclusive and member-engaged association.

As a TABCO Board Member and TABCO President, Cindy compassionately led with conviction. She has been steadfast in fighting for effective recruitment and retention initiatives to ensure new educators are supported, valued, and remain with BCPS. Cindy's tenure as president navigated some scary and polarizing events including the COVID-19 pandemic, safely returning to in-person learning, the ransomware attack, funding challenges, and unyielding attacks on public education. Through it all, Cindy centered her advocacy and leadership on educator and student needs. For these and many more reasons, Cindy is recognized for the TABCO Leadership Service Award.

Tribute from TABCO-Retired~

From our first meeting with newly elected President Cindy Sexton in October of 2019, it was obvious that she was a firm supporter of the rights of retired TABCO members and that she believed that retired members were both a resource and an asset to the Association. Building upon her positivity, we made slow but important steps toward more opportunities for involvement and connection. When retirees faced huge financial and benefits problems due to the cyber-attack on BCPS systems, Cindy facilitated regular meetings between TABCO-R and then-Assistant Superintendent Myriam Yarbrough (now Superintendent Rogers) and other BCPS personnel that led to positive resolutions, and produced a solid, continuing connection between BCPS and retiree advocates. Thanks to Cindy's continued leadership, it is clear that TABCO supports its retired members. Without her moral support and advocacy, the goal of revising bylaws to establish a voting retiree seat on the TABCO Board of Directors could not have been achieved. Cindy has a talent for strong diplomacy. In the most positive way, Cindy can be the "iron fist in a velvet glove," not giving an inch while preserving civility and dignity as she advocates for educator rights. She leads the path through dissent to resolution with insight and intelligence.

Her vision for TABCO and her inclusiveness of TABCO-Retired have been inspirational.


